Here is a variety of beaches across the island- each distinctly different from the last- and sure to make this summer something special!

Elbow Beach

Elbow Beach, one of the most beautiful pink south shore beaches, has a gentle curve resembling an elbow, where it gets its name. Elbow beach is also home to the Pollokshields shipwreck which is located about 100 yards off shore. You can take an escorted snorkel/kayak tour or you can just rent kayaks/paddle boards & explore yourself. Elbow beach is also ideal for swimming, long walks or even beach volleyball!



Church Bay



This picturesque beach is a snorkeler's paradise. The reef is close to shore and provides shelter from the waves, with a colorful variety of marine life. You can find cup and boiler reefs in the Bay, but not many hard corals. There is also a unique feature peeking out of the waters, known as 'Poodle Rock'.

Achilles Bay

Achilles Bay is a beautiful intimate beach located right next to Fort St. Catherine. The beach, shaped like a heel, was named after the great warrior Achilles who died from an arrow shot at his heels. You can combine a lunch at Blackbeard's Hideout Restaurant with a visit to this less crowded beach. It's ideal for swimming & snorkeling and this little gem is also known for having some of the most stunning sunset views if you decide to stay for them.



Long Beach



You will find Coopers Island Natural Reserve or Long Beach located at the southeastern tip of Bermuda. This is not your typical beach. From views of Castle Harbor to a broad range of walking trails, snorkeling, turtle spotting, bird watching, picnic areas, and many additional natural attractions, this will be a day for the books.

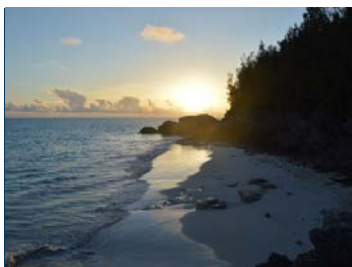


Astwood Cove

Astwood Cove is a secluded beach surrounded by cliffs, you will need to hike a bit in order to reach the beach. The steep cliffs make it a bit of a climb, but definitely worth doing. This beach might be one of the most romantic spots in Bermuda because of the secluded-ness. Many tropical birds live within the cliffs, so the only thing that could disrupt the romantic vibe would be the birds and other travelers that hike down.



West Whale Bay



Back in the 18th Century, this beach received its name because it was near Bermuda's whaling grounds, which no longer exist in this day and age. However, the whales do frequent Bermuda each year in the spring and you may spot a humpback whale if you're lucky. The low tide and shallow waters make West Whale Beach a family friendly area. It's also a great spot for shing. If you're feeling adventurous you can also explore Whale Bay Fort located nearby.
